

The Stutchbury Salver

The RHS Bronze Medal has been awarded by Grayshott Gardeners (GGs) annually to the person (or persons) who has received the highest number of points in all allowable classes in the Spring and Summer Shows combined.

It is the most prestigious award made by GGs.

However, the RHS has unfortunately discontinued their Bronze Medal. Although GGs have purchased seven extra medals, there would not be an award available after these have been awarded.



But 'Lady Luck' has stepped in.

John and Joy Stutchbury were knowledgeable gardeners, stalwarts, keen supporters and regular award winners in GGs for many years. "Grayshott Gardeners" ran through their veins. The "Gee-Gees" were a major part of the lives of both of them for the 30 plus years

they supported the club.

After John and Joy died, their children, Neil, Patricia and Janine wanted their parents' name to be remembered in Grayshott Gardeners and generously offered to donate an award in memory of "JF & BJ Stutchbury".

As a result, GGs is proud to have received a new trophy from the Stutchbury family which will be called the "Stutchbury Salver". It will replace the RHS Bronze Medal as the highest award GGs can bestow.

At the AGM in November Neil, Patricia and Janine came to present the salver for the first time to the **2025 winners**, **Pamela and Alan Wright**. The winners will receive the Stutchbury Salver and an RHS Bronze Medal to keep. The salver will be handed back to GGs to be awarded again at the next AGM. An RHS Bronze Medal will be given as a memento until our stock of seven medals is exhausted.

How can I get tickets for the Hamper raffle?


- 1. Either: Tickets will be given in exchange for each and every item you donate for the food bank. For example: 1 item = 1 ticket; 7 items = 7 tickets and so on
- 2. Or: You can buy tickets for the raffle in the usual way. I'm delighted to announce that all profit from the sale of tickets will ALSO be donated to help support the food bank
 - 3. Or: You can donate items AND buy tickets if you're feeling very generous!

What should I bring?

- Christmas treats e.g. Mince pies, chocolate, biscuits, nuts, crisps, Christmas crackers
 - Basic groceries e.g. Tea, coffee, cereal, pasta, rice, tins, jam
 - Sundries e.g. toothpaste, shower gel

NB. Items should all have a post-Xmas use-by date

So please come along on 10 December armed with items for the food bank and perhaps also funds to buy some raffle tickets – who knows, you might be one of the three lucky winners of a Hamper.

At the moment, this food bank supports 58 households across the local community, including Grayshott. That's 71 adults and 58 children.

The organisers are arranging a Christmas afternoon and Father Christmas will give a present to each child while the adults will go home with a Hamper filled with Christmas goodies.

I have arranged to take our donations along on 11 December. Last year I was able to take the 153 items donated by Grayshott Gardeners and I hope that this year there will be even more.

Five Years, Three Rescue Dogs, and One Mildly Chaotic Garden Transformation

Alex and I bought our house about five years ago, and the garden was... well, let's call it "optimistically plain".

A bit of lawn, a patio, and the sort of personality you'd expect from a wet digestive. Being a relatively new build, it had all the charm of a supermarket car park, so we decided to create an all-season oasis.

Naturally, this began with hours of planning, followed by hours of drinking tea, followed by more planning to decide if we needed more tea. Eventually, we committed to a plan, which we immediately changed because that's the law of gardening.














We set our hearts (and backs) on installing a path, building raised beds, creating a pond, and constructing a pergola. Oh, and we intended to plant everything. What made this particularly exciting (or questionable, depending on how charitable you're feeling) is that we decided to do it all ourselves. Yes, two full-time workers and three rescue dogs "helping" in the way dogs do - supervising, digging in the wrong spot, and occasionally stealing gloves.

We started by digging up the lawn and putting in the path, then the raised beds, then the pond. And finally, the pergola. If you ever get the sudden urge to build a pergola with no prior experience, may I gently suggest having a lie down instead? But we survived it, relationship intact, and moved on to the fun part: filling every conceivable space with plants.


We raided the sale racks of every garden centre within a 20-mile radius. If it was reduced, drought-tolerant-ish, or even vaguely green, it came home with us. We think we're at around 150 plants so far, though the dogs may have eaten a few labels, so who really knows?

We've still got a fruit and veg patch to create at the back, but at the moment we're taking a well-earned breather. After five years of mud, tea, sunburn, and swearing at timber, it's finally coming together.











Now when we sit outside with our three dogs, a cuppa, and only minor aches, we forget all the hard work. We listen to the birds, watch the frogs settling into the pond, and breathe in the scent of all those bargain-bin plants thriving like they always believed in us. We've created our own little oasis, and honestly? We can't wait to see how it grows, preferably at a pace that doesn't require us to prune it every five minutes.

Jobs for this month - December

Gardening in December

(excerpts taken from the RHS website)

Winter frost

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need work to keep you warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Check your winter protection and if you have a greenhouse make sure the heater is working. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning.

1. Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place

Cold, wet, windy winter weather can damage trees, shrubs and garden structures such as trellis. Improving shelter, staking plants, mulching, wrapping pots and careful matching of plants to places will help



to prevent this kind of damage.

2. Check that greenhouse heaters are working

The high cost of fuel and the desire to garden sustainably are concentrating gardeners' attention on operating greenhouses with the minimum



energy usage. Here is our practical advice on heating greenhouses efficiently. https://www.rhs.org.uk/garden-features/heating-greenhouses-efficiently

3. Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing



If your pond is stocked with fish and it does freeze over, melt the ice by placing a hot pan on the surface, or install a pond heater or water feature to prevent freezing occurring.

More Jobs for this month

Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls)

Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding

Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root crops

Trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted

Take hardwood cuttings

Keep mice away from stored produce

Reduce watering of houseplants
